The estimate was slightly under \$42,000, but if it is discovered that we need to do some replacement work, we will incur additional costs, which we cannot estimate with any accuracy at this time. We will schedule a vote for October 20 at both worship services (as we did for the boiler replacement). We will need 70 persons for quorum, and a 2/3 majority to proceed with this necessary repair (roof leaks). Additional information will be forthcoming, as the vote nears. Please reserve the date. Anyone who is an active member at Huff's may vote (which includes our teenagers who have already been confirmed).

QPR (Question, Persuade, Refer) Suicide Prevention

From the PSEC Conference Minister: Christianity in dangerous places

Luke 14:26 "Whoever comes to me and does not hate father and mother, wife and children, brothers and sisters, yes, and even life itself, cannot be my disciple. ²⁷Whoever does not carry the cross and follow me cannot be my disciple."

Helicopters flew over my home this morning. Several. The last time I saw that many helios "holding on station" I was in Iraq. These were responding to another shooting. This time at a veteran's living facility in East Vincent Township.

Gun violence and mass shootings have filled the news since my last writing in this space when I suggested that all gun owners should be required to serve in their state's militia (a suggestion that was too bold for some and not bold enough for others). It feels as if the world is more dangerous now than it ever has been. It *feels* that way but *is it* that way? The violence lived out on our streets and covered in our news is heart rending and defies both rational explanation and political solution. But it is not new to the human condition. I am not sure I could convince a first century Palestinian Jew living under the constant threat of crucifixion that our time is more dangerous than his. Or hers. Or theirs.

And yet that is exactly where Jesus invites his followers to go. With him. Into the danger. "Whoever does not carry the cross and follow me cannot be my disciple." "When Christ calls a man," wrote Dietrich Bonhoeffer, "he bids him come and die." The transformative power of the gospel comes alive most vividly in dangerous places. In relationships that threaten the status quo. In conversations between drastically different people determined to stay in relationship. In prophetically pastoral sermons that challenge the perspectives of paying church customers.

If we wait for the spaces we minister in to be safe, we may wait for a long time. I expect that in dangerous places Jesus will show up very quickly. He has in those dangerous places my journey has taken me and I give thanks for the certain knowledge he always will.

May it be so, too, for you and the people you love. Bill (Rev. William Worley, Conference Minister)

Pastor's Article

Dear Friends,

We have just celebrated our 275th anniversary, re-connected with old friends, met some new people, and heard inspiring words and prayers from our Pennsylvania Southeast Conference Minister, Rev. Bill Worley, and our Northeastern PA Synod Bishop Zeiser. It's good to celebrate, and take some time to recognize just how far we've come.

However, our job is never done, if we are followers of Jesus Christ. Early Germans from the Palatinate and Switzerland came to the colony of Pennsylvania for religious freedom, having suffered great hardships in religious wars. Often bringing with them the Bible, a hymnal and a catechism, they struggled to establish themselves in a place that must have seemed quite wild and primitive. Yet persevere they did, and we are the richer for it.

They were challenged to find new ways of organizing for worship since there were no church buildings, new ways of funding worship since there was no church tax collected by the government and given to the church, and finding Christians leaders who could be ordained to offer the sacraments and who could officiate at weddings and funerals. Because of their diligence in these matters, we have the church structure and organization of today.

Yet, times continue to change, and new challenges arise. Whoever would have thought that modern people would decide there is no God, or that the churches, rather than being a place to come to God, are places that are finger-pointing and self-serving? Institutions that grew to meet the demands of earlier ages are reeling from the quick pace of change, that makes many outside the church think that their message is obsolete. We read daily of young adults and their struggles, and statistics reveal they are not turning to either evangelical or mainline congregations for spiritual help. According to a recent article in Christian Century magazine, only 1.25% of white adults age 18-29 are church members in evangelical denominations, with the same percentage in mainline denominations. There is a need for a Christian voice of welcome and love, of support and care, yet young people are not finding their way into established religious institutions. What can we do?

I think of Jesus saying, "The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few; therefore ask the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into his harvest." (Matthew 9: 37-38) Are we willing to

do the hard work to go out from the churches into the places that are hurting, in order to offer Jesus' words of hope? What might that look like? Where are we most needed? What talents do we have to equip us for such a different style of ministry—going out in order to bring people in?

We need to pray about where God is calling us, and just what sort of congregation God is calling us to be. Rather than jump on any bandwagon that promises rapid turnaround, we need to ask for God's direction to know where we may best serve God and neighbor. We may want quick and easy answers, but in such times of change, there is no quick fix.

We need to celebrate all we have been to many generations, even while we challenge ourselves to become a source of hope to new generations. We don't need a new gospel, but we might need a new way of telling the stories of people's lives changed by connection to Jesus.

Let's continue to pray our congregation into a future, led by God, and based upon the good foundation we have received from those who struggled for 275 years to be the church in Huff's Church. We are so privileged; we have such love to share; let's pray just how this might take place in our future.
